

ne of the beautiful things about Cyprus is its heritage and history. Every street has got a history dating back to the 16th or even the 10th century. It's one thing to read about the ancient Greeks or Romans, but it's a different story when physically at the place.

My best subject in high school was History, and even now, if I were to be a teacher, I would go for History. Now it's incredible to walk in a historical land. I love discovering the past in the present by explaining ancient history.

One hot afternoon, I went on a walking spree with my friend, and we came across an old building. Well, this is normal in North Cyprus, considering that's the attractive aspect of the island. Out of curiosity, we stepped inside to get a glimpse only to discover that it was an old church, Chrysopolitissa Church. The historian in me was suddenly aroused.

Chrysopolitissa Church is the oldest church in Kyrenia. It was built as a Latin church around the 14th century. It's located opposite the rear entrance of the Folk Art Museum, which is at the back of the Kyrenia Harbour.

The unique structure of this church is its Gothic doorway on the North Side, and because of that, it is believed that it was French-influenced. There is a crucifixion of Jesus Christ engraved on the wall of the front entrance. Inside, there is an altar and an extended side with its own door.

After 'touring', I decided to do further research on the church on the internet. As I was going through the reviews, I noticed that I wasn't the only one concerned about the maintenance of this place; some are willing to go an extra mile to make sure this place is well kept. As a result of not being used or at least preserved as a historical site, the roof has fallen, and its walls are dilapidating. With the way I love history, I was hurt to see how this historical treasure is being treated as an ordinary building.

Sadly, with the efforts of some individuals like Hans Doeleman, nothing has been done to revive or maintain this infrastructure. "And yes, I have called the Girne Belediyesi to report. And yes, I was told to drive from Alsancak to Girne and report the vandalizing to the Girne Police. I'll do it tomorrow. It's not easy to help Cypriot Turks to protect their Byzantine and medieval monuments," he stated.

With the rate at which the Chrysopolitissa Church is crumbling, one can only wonder if the building will still be in existence a few years from now.

### ONE ON ONE WITH MR MIKE

#### We are all architects of something even our own lives. You choose the way you want to build your life.

Born in Nigeria, Michael Onyekachi ljere is an architect who currently resides in North Cyprus. We sat down with him, and we were privileged to receive insights into his journey as an architect. He plays bass guitar in church and in his free time. With the nature of the field he's in. we were not that surprised when he said his hobbies include doing anything creative. He attributed the vast amount of knowledge he carries to the mentorship of his mother, his pastor, Apostle Dr. Anvi Obi. and his lecturers. Below is a transcription of the interview.

#### Q: How do you juggle between university life, church, and your social life?

A: You have to know how to manage your time properly and prioritize what is important. I had to cut down my sleeping hours. If you have a busy schedule and you know what's expected of you, you cannot be sleeping like everyone else. You have to be disciplined in that aspect.

Q: Where do you get your inspiration and do you do any researches? The good thing is everyone has a unique mind and designs so we can never say we have had enough architects.

A: My inspiration mainly comes from buildings that I see that appeal to my architectural style. I do a lot of research on what some of the top architects are currently doing to draw inspiration.

#### Q: Are there any prominent architects that you would want to work with?

A: One of the prominent architects that I am sure a lot of architects would have wanted to work with is Zaha Hadid. Unfortunately, she is late now but her company still exists. So it will be like a dream come true to work there. There is also the British architect, Norman Foster whose designs inspire me. He has a lot of notable buildings in the United Kingdom.

#### Q: When you see buildings, do you subconsciously find yourself making any structural changes?

A: Yes, I do. You know as architects, especially architectural students, we are trained in a way to look at buildings critically. Naturally, we bring that into the real world, so when I see buildings, I always think of ways in which they can be modified. Architects are like natural critics of everything around them.

#### Q: Given the chance, what sort of structure would you want to design?

A: I like very light steel structures with a lot of glass and can let in a lot of natural light. And I think it's important for architectural students to find their design language on time because finding your niche will help you to focus.

#### Q: Would you rather design your house or give the chance to fellow architects?

A: Funny enough, I would want to design my own house but then I will source ideas and advice from other architects because I would like to get as many ideas as possible. After all, two heads are better than one. It would be nice to have other people's concepts but the general one would be mine.

#### Q: What is your favorite designing tool?

A: In any department, everyone has their favorite tool, topic, or even formula. When I was a student, the truffles were my favorite. I would like to encourage other architectural students to focus on learning a lot of software because it's a great advantage when seeking employment. For any design you make, let the quality be good enough to go into your portfolio.

Q: Comparing the architecture that was there in the 15<sup>th</sup> century, do you feel like the structures nowadays are of low quality compared to that period?

A: I would say the structures we have now are of better quality in the sense that as architects, everything we do affects the natural environment. Architects nowadays are more aware of this so they are designing environmentally friendly structures. The buildings back then were more of a sentimental value but now they are designed according to their function.

#### Q: How does architecture integrate with real-life experiences?

A: I believe in one way or the other, we are all architects of something even our own lives. You choose the way you want to build your life. The architectural design process starts by planning, likewise, in life, you plan what you want to do. Then analyzing the conditions, we call this environmental analysis. Analyze the conditions around you that could affect what you want to build and decide how you are going to deal with those things. Then finally you start building step by step. You cannot rush the process otherwise your building, your life, will collapse.

### Q: Where do you see yourself in 3 to 5 years?

A: I would say I see myself starting my architectural studio. From now to the next 2 or 3 years, I would want to work under another person to learn more and also to add to my portfolio which is what I am doing now.

# Q: Is there room for those who would want to enter the field of architecture?

A: There is still space. Human beings will always need shelter so, there will always be a need for architects. The good thing is everyone has a unique mind and designs so we can never say we have had enough architects.



## A BRICK BOX By Tapiwanashe Matorevhu

S tep by step, brick by brick, a house is built, and it comes to life. What starts as a plan on paper soon becomes a dream come true into reality. There are different kinds of processes and materials required when building a house or a building in general. One major thing that is required is bricks. They are essential in the building process. For a house to stand firm, it will need solid and

good-quality bricks.

### The middle of nowhere (The preparation)

#### Through the fire

After the bricks dry in the sun, they are built into a structure where they are burnt with fire. This structure is made so as to burn the bricks on fire for them to become rigid and strong. After the structure is done, they are burnt, and the bricks get to be firm and ready for use. Each brick should go through this process for it to become good quality to be used for building. Going through fire is not a pleasant process; however, it's unavoidable. It's needed and very necessary. Everyone goes through tough times in life; it's inevitable. At times you don't see the necessity of the situation, but once you get out of it and take time to reflect, you get to be grateful for the strong person you turned out to be. How you view situations in life is important. Perspective matters in life. It determines how you react to and deal with things. It acts as a guide on the outcome. What one may view as a tragedy can be seen as a stepping stone by another. Fire is part of the process; it makes you stronger and prepares you for your purpose. Fire purifies, fire strengthens, brace yourself and go through it.


#### Brick by brick

If passion is embedded in your capabilities, it increases the resilience to stand any stress. just as the brick force increases resistance to tensional

stressors.

Brick force ties the walls together even over unsupported openings like windows, doors, or when built on unstable ground. Passion gives us stability even when we are not supported financially or do not have enough to keep us going. It helps us to identify cracks within our walls and block them from continuing. It gives us the tenacity to go on and never to give up. It is like an adhesive that holds us together when a lot is pulling us apart and down. Like a brick force that increases the durability of a wall, passion increases perseverance and determination.

Line upon line, right from the foundation to the top, passion makes us very tenacious such that when one tunnel meets a dead end, we start on another, and we never stop until we see the light. It is why we survive termites and moisture in the ground, and temperature changes at the top. We continue striving to reach the top.
